THE SCHOOL AND THE COMMUNITY

Fairhope High School first opened its doors to Eastern Shore students in 1923. In 1993, a new facility was built on Highway 98 where it sits on 80 acres of beautifully manicured lawn. The modern building and attractive landscaping are a direct reflection of the community support that benefits Fairhope High School, as well as the school pride that is felt by students, faculty, staff and administration. It is a modern, comprehensive four-year high school with an enrollment of almost 1,600 in grades 9-12. Our motto "A Community For Everyone" demonstrates the overall strong academic climate of Fairhope High School. In 2007, we opened a state-of-the-art fine arts wing on our campus that includes a 350 seat capacity black box theater, a television production studio, and multiple classrooms for band, chorus and art courses. In 2021, we opened a Freshman Academy with over 20 classrooms for just our 9th grade students.

ACCREDITATION

Fairhope High School is fully accredited by AdvancEd. AdvancEd is the unified organization of the North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement (NCA CASI), Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement (SACS CASI), and Commission on International and Transregional Accreditation (CITA). AdvancEd is dedicated to advancing excellence in education worldwide through accreditation, research and professional services.

THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Designed to motivate and challenge all students, the academic program at Fairhope High School is driven by equity and the highest possible learning expectations for students. During their high school career, students have access to a wide range of learning experiences, including the International Baccalaureate, Programme, Advanced Placement, Honors and Dual Enrollment courses in all content areas. Located in a community that celebrates the arts, our school has an extensive fine arts program that includes courses in art, dance, music and theater. Foreign Language courses are offered in Spanish and French. Students also have the opportunity to participate in distance learning through ACCESS (Alabama Connecting Classrooms, Educators, and Students Statewide).

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

There are three diplomas offered, all requiring four units each of English, history, science and math (to include at least Algebra, Geometry and Algebra 2 or its equivalent). Students must meet additional requirements of one career preparedness credit, one PE credit, one-half credit of health, and three credits of any combination of career tech, fine art or foreign language courses.

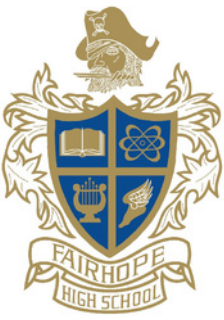

Students are not limited to enrolling in a specific number of advanced level courses. Students are recommended to take advanced level courses based on their prior grades and with teacher approval. However, students can go against recommendation by signing a waiver. 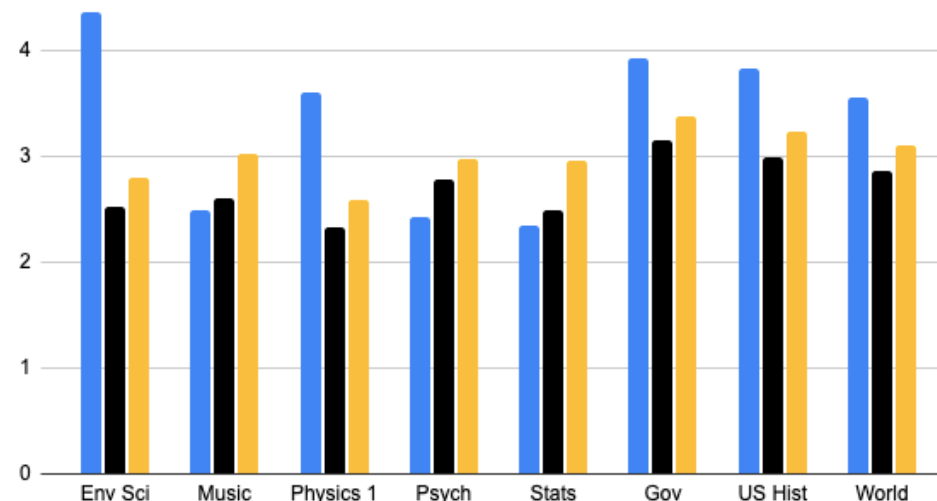
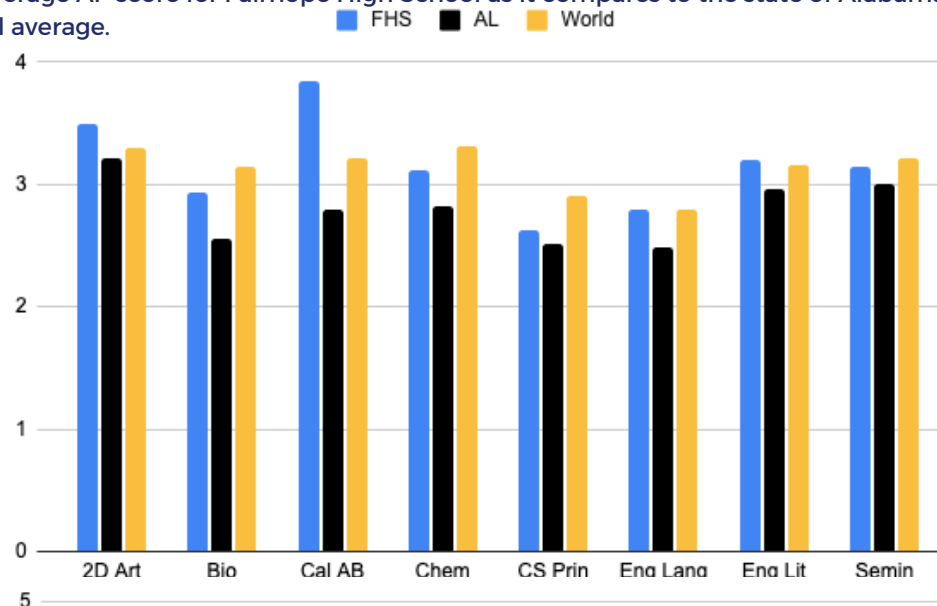
POST SECONDARY ENROLLMENT

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAMME

Fairhope High School is an authorized International Baccalaureate World School. The International Baccalaureate Organization's Diploma Programme (DP), is a demanding pre-university course of study that is designed for highly motivated students. The DP offers the most rigorous secondary curriculum, with a strong emphasis on oral and written communication, critical thinking skills and community service. There are a total of 45 students enrolled in the Diploma Programme, 17 seniors and 28 juniors. The FHS IB class of 2024 had 11 students, 91% of which earned the full IB Diploma. Other outstanding accomplishments of the class include an average ACT composite score of a 30. The average weighted GPA of this group of 11 students is 4.47 and they were offered just under 4 million dollars in scholarships.

CAS AND THE EE

Creativity, Action and Service (CAS) is a fundamental part of the Diploma Programme experience. CAS encourages students to share their energy and special talents with others by requiring them to engage in at least three to four hours of service activities each week during the two years of the programme. The Extended Essay (EE) is the end result of a research project undertaken by Diploma Programme candidates in their 11th and 12th grade years. Students spend approximately 40 hours to create this 4,000 word paper. CAS hours and the EE are both required to obtain the IB Diploma.

IB COURSES OFFERED

At least three, and not more than four, courses are taken at higher level (HL), the others at standard level (SL). HL courses represent 240 teaching hours or the equivalent of two full years of in-depth study. SL courses represent 150 teaching hours.
